Getting an Autism Diagnosis

An autism assessment needs to be done by a multidisciplinary team consisting of a paediatrician, psychologist and speech therapist. Sometimes an occupational therapist is additionally included in the team. All of these assessors must independently agree on the diagnosis.

These assessments can be done at no cost through Disability Services Commission's Eligibility department — 9426 9200. As of Aug 2012 for children 0-6 there is about a 6 month waitlist for assessments and for children 6-16 there is around a 1 year waitlist. Individuals over 16 years are unable to be assessed for Autism through the Commission.

Alternatively the assessments can be done privately and subsidised through the Federal Helping Children with Autism program. This program has Medicare items available for:

- paediatricians and psychiatrists to diagnose and develop a treatment and management plan for a child aged under 13 years on referral from a general practitioner;
- audiologists, occupational therapists, optometrists, orthoptists, physiotherapists, psychologists and speech pathologists to provide up to four services in total per child per lifetime, to collaborate with the paediatrician or psychiatrist on the diagnosis, where required. These services must be provided before the child's 13th birthday.

Once an autism diagnosis has been obtained it is encouraged that a copy of the assessment is provided to Disability Services Commission's (DSC) Eligibility department so the child can be assessed for eligibility for state funded services through the Commission. DSC Eligibility can be contacted on 9426 9232.

You have an Autism Diagnosis - What next?

- If your child is 6yo or under link in immediately with your Autism Advisor
- Organise funded Early Intervention therapy if your child is 6yo or under.
- Refer to funded school-age therapy services if your child is 7-15yo
- Link in with your LAC and/ or support groups to find out about more information
- Consider Sibling Supports if your child has a sibling
- If significant behavioural issues are present explore psychology and/or behavioural interventions
- Consider social/recreational activities for your child to help with social skill development

Autism Specific Supports

Autism Advisors - A national program of Autism Advisors is available across Australia to provide information and advice to parents and carers of children aged 0-6 who are diagnosed with an Autism Spectrum Disorder. The WA Autism Advisor accessed through the Autism Association of Western Australia. Contact: (08) 9489 8900 or visit www.autism.org.au. Autism advisors are able to help provide a link between the clinical diagnosis & access to early intervention (EI) programs & support services as well as support families from rural and remote areas to apply for a one- off rural and remote payment of \$2000 per eligible child to cover the additional expenses associated with accessing early intervention services.

Early Days: a national autism workshops program - Early Days is a program of free online and/or face to face workshops for parents and family carers of young children with an autism spectrum disorder. The program is funded under the Helping Children with Autism package. Phone 9489 8900 or visit www.earlydays.net.au for more information.

PlayConnect Playgroups - At a PlayConnect Playgroups, children from 0-6 with Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) and ASD like symptoms (no formal diagnosis required) have the opportunity to play for 2 hrs a week in a secure, supportive environment with their parents, carers and other family members. It provides opportunities for parents and carers to meet other families with children with ASD in their area and access information about how to link with early intervention programs and support services. For information contact 1800 171 882. At present in the northern suburbs there are play connect playgroups in Whitfords and North Perth.

Autism Spectrum Disorder Website - The Raising Children Network (RCN) ASD website provides information, online resources and interactive functions to support parents, families, carers and professionals. The RCN is an Australian Government funded site providing information to parents of children from birth to school age.

Autism Specific Early Learning and Care Centres - The Autism Association of Western Australia in partnership with Curtin University and Mercy Care Childcare Services provides a service to parents and carers seeking long day care for children with Autism, or children who are going through the diagnostic process, and are aged 0 to 6 years. The centre provides Autism specific, early learning programs within a long day care setting. The Autism Association's Autism Specific Early Learning and Care Centre is located within the Mercy Care Childcare Services in Bedford. Contact Program Manager – 6380 5504.

Early intervention assistance - The early intervention funding under the Helping Children with Autism package is aimed at providing increased access to early intervention for children aged 0-6 with an ASD. The eligibility criteria for children accessing the early intervention funding through the Helping Children with Autism package is as follows:

- All eligible children up to their sixth birthday will now have access to the early intervention funding of up to \$12,000 (up to \$6,000 per financial year) regardless of whether or not they have commenced school.
- From the child's sixth birthday until their seventh birthday, special consideration may be given which
 would allow continued access to the funding. This will be determined by an Autism Advisor on a caseby-case basis using nationally consistent criteria.
- Once a child turns seven years of age they are no longer eligible to access funding under the early intervention component of the package.

A list of early intervention providers - note: 2 or more of these providers can be used at one time through the Helping Children with Autism funding.

Children with Intellectual Disability and Autism who are 0-6 years of age may access state funded early intervention therapy from approved providers in addition to the early intervention therapy being accessed through the Helping Children with Autism Federal funding package.

Professional Development and other Workshops - Families are able to access a variety of training and workshops on autism-related subjects. The Department of Education, Employment and Workplace Relations (DEEWR) offers:

- professional development for teachers and other school staff to support school students with ASDs to achieve better educational outcomes and
- funding for parents and carers of school students with ASDs to attend workshops and information sessions and to access online workshops and information.

This program is being delivered through 'Positive Partnerships' at the <u>Autism Training website</u> (http://www.autismtraining.com.au).

Additional training and workshops are held by a variety of School Age Therapy Providers (details listed further below) and where there are costs involved for families to attend, funding may be applied for through the Commonwealth Carelink Centre - 1800 052 222.

Medicare items for school age children with autism - The Department of Health and Ageing under the Helping Children with Autism program has made new Medicare items available for children aged under 15 years (for treatment). Medicare items are available for audiologists, occupational therapists, optometrists, orthoptists, physiotherapists, psychologists and speech pathologists to provide up to 20 early intervention treatment services in total per child per lifetime following a diagnosis of autism/PDD for the child, and consistent with the treatment and management plan prepared by the referring practitioner. These services must be provided before the child's 15th birthday, provided an autism/PDD treatment and management plan was in place before the child's 13th birthday. In addition to Medicare items under Helping Children with Autism, children with autism and/or their families may be able to additionally access some subsidised psychology support through two programs:

School Age Therapy

Children with an autism diagnosis who have been assessed privately are able to provide a copy of the assessment to Disability Services Commission's Eligibility department so the child can be assessed for eligibility for state funded services through the Commission. Supports for children in Playgroups/Childcare/Vacation/Holiday Programs

All children have the right to be included in their local playgroup / childcare and/or vacation program and no program may discriminate. Sometimes the specific needs of the child may be complex and additional support is required to ensure the child is fully included in the program. In these instances, supports can generally be accessed with the correct planning.

At all times LACs promote the inclusion of children in their local, mainstream program. To ensure this occurs successfully with the child being valued and included and program staff being confident about their inclusion, a lot more preparation needs to be done than simply booking them into the program.

Meeting with program staff well in advance to talk about what is needed for the child's successful inclusion is a must, and this allows for additional supports / training to be accessed if required. If you are considering support for the upcoming school holidays, approach the centre providing the holiday program 4-6 weeks ahead of the holidays to talk about your child's needs so if required they can start sourcing additional staff and the funding for this.

Familiarising your child with the centre before the holiday program begins is also a useful idea.

Kalparrin Centre – 9340 8094 provides practical and emotional support to families of children with special needs. Can link people up with others experiencing similar situations, provides camps and retreats etc.

<u>Dads Matters</u> — is a Kalparrin program offering dads the opportunity to listen to a range of guest speakers, hear from a panel of dads as well as meet and socialise with other dads of children with special needs. <u>Couples Respite Weekends</u> — offered through Kalparrin are designed to strengthen the relationship between couples living in a committed relationship and caring for a child with a disability. They offer workshop sessions which encourage talking about the effect having a child with a disability has on your relationship, teach ways to strengthen communication skills, coping strategies and manage stress within the relationship as a result. The Skips group – 9401 2699 meet weekly (on Fridays) at the Granny Spiers centre (2 Albatross Ct, Heathridge) – it's a group that provides play activities for children 8 weeks to 6 years with special needs and their siblings and well as providing respite, support and social activities for their mums. Amenity fee \$3 and crèche \$4 per child applies.

My Time Fridays – 9401 2699 offers a weekly local support group for anyone caring for a young child with a disability or chronic medical condition. Parents socialise and share ideas with others who understand and a play leader keeps the children busy and active – also at Granny Spiers centre- 2 Albatross Ct, Heathridge.

Friday Girls Lunch Bunch - This group mainly consists of carers who have a family member who has a disability but it is an inclusive group open to anyone. LACs are also invited by the group to participate and provide relevant information and support. The group meets on the 2nd Friday of each month to share stories and info, support and encourage each other, apply for funding to plan carer breaks and to catch up, enjoy lunch and have some fun. Playconnect Playgroup offers a weekly facilitated Playgroup for families with children aged 0-6 with Autism Spectrum Disorder(ASD) or similar needs. Children do not need a diagnosis to participate and siblings aged 0-6 years can join in too. Families with children with a developmental delay or needs related

Supports for Parents/Carers - Crisis / Counselling / Psychology Support

Crisis Care – 1800 199 008 or 9223 1111 offers a 24hr helpline, 7 days a week in the event you feel you can't cope or need support urgently.

Edith Cowan University Psychological Services Centre - This service provides psych services to the community of Perth at a teaching clinic located in Joondalup. The clinic is the primary training centre for post grad students in the School of Psychology at ECU. The client can self-refer or be referred by a health professional. Ring 9301 0011

Wanslea Family Services – Grandcare - This is a telephone service providing information, advocacy, support and also support groups for Grandparents who care for their grandchildren on a full-time basis. There is no waiting time & no charge. Ring 1800 008 323

Carers WA - The Carers Counseling Line is available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, and provides a safe place to express their emotions, needs and wants anytime. This is a professional & confidential service. Ring 1800 007 332. There is also a mobile counselor offering face to face sessions at fixed venues in the metropolitan area. For this service, phone 9444 5922. To be eligible, a person must provide regular and sustained care/assistance to another person without payment (other than a carer pension or allowance).

Centrecare Counselling Service - This service provides confidential and professional counselling and support to individuals, couples and families. Issues may cover depression, loss and grief, addictions, relationships, finance, arguments, step family conflicts, adjusting to change, separation, anger and loneliness, etc. There are also special 'Men in Relationship Program Services' and self development courses. There may be a waiting list for some services. Ring them on 9325 6644.

Women's Healthworks - This Joondalup based agency provides counselling with a registered psychologist as well as a number of other support and information services. There may be a waitlist and session costs are often negotiable. Ring 9300 1566.

Relationships Australia - This agency provides counselling, relationship education, mediation and professional training services. There are also courses and seminars to people wanting to learn how to make their relationships more successful. Some examples of these are Communication, Assertiveness, Managing angry emotions, Positive Parenting, and many more. The fee for counselling is based on a sliding scale and their aim is be affordable to all income levels. Ring 1300 364 277.

Mindworks - Provides counselling in Joondalup with a discreet professional psychotherapy service for the general public. Their counsellors are experienced specialist clinical psychologists and psychologists. Substantial private and medicare rebates may apply, ask your GP for a referral. Contact: 9300 0755

Anglicare's Kinway Counselling Program – 9400 7200 (Grace House in Joondalup) offers a no-cost counselling and mediation service in Joondalup for people caring for a family member with a disability. They are able to offer advice, information and referrals to assist families in this situation – specifically in the areas of future planning, dealing with relationship conflict and breakdown due to stresses, grief and loss around coming to terms with the disability etc...

MercyCare in Joondalup offers a free reconnect program (that can do home visits) for people 12-18yo who have difficulties staying at home 1800 800 406.

Behavioural Supports

In addition to the Medicare items under Helping Children with Autism, children and/or their families may be able to access some subsidised psychology or counselling support for behavioural issues through alternative options – thus saving their autism rebates for specific therapy needs:

Art Yo & Art Gro – Art Therapy programs are for 13-17yo and 18-25yo who may be experiencing emotional issues, depression or stress. It is facilitated by a registered psychologist and art therapist and is 100% free of charge. It is carried out once a week for 2hrs per session, 8 weeks of school term or in the summer holidays. Referrals accepted from GP, Psychologist, Social Worker or Allied Mental Health Professional. Wanslea Family Services - This agency provides a service called Creating Stronger Families. This is a parenting program for families who have identified that they require assistance with routine and behavioural management for their children. Workers work in the home to assist parents. The team includes a Social Worker and Family Care Worker. People who are already a client of DCD have a priority to this service. It has a waiting list. There is no charge. Ring 9245 2441

Specialist Behavioural Support is for people with disability aged six to 25, aim to improve the safety, wellbeing, skills and quality of life for the person with disability. They also aim to prevent family breakdown or the placement of the person with disability in accommodation other than the family home. The teams work intensively with the individual and family to increase their understanding and management of the challenging behaviour. The service is time-limited (usually six to nine months). To gain access to the service, a referral must be made through the family's LAC. Referrals are usually called for twice a year and the LAC can let the family know when referrals can be made. Financial or in kind Supports

Incontinence Pad Schemes — Many children with developmental or other disabilities may take a lot longer to toilet train. Consequently there are a few Incontinence Pad Schemes you can apply for which give significant discounts on nappies or other incontinence products (savings generally around \$500/yr on popular brands like Snugglers & Huggies).

The Companion Card is issued to people with a significant, permanent disability, who can demonstrate that they are unable to access most community activities and venues without attendant care support. The card contains a photograph of the cardholder and is presented when booking or purchasing tickets or entering a venue and entry costs for the support person providing the care are not charged. Kidsport allows eligible children aged 18 or under to apply for up to \$200 per year financial assistance to contribute towards club fees. The Club has to be an incorporated association. Applications forms can be completed by families and submitted with photocopy of family's Health Care Card or if there is no health care card in the child's name, your LAC may be able to write a letter recommending them for the program. Transperth Carers Travel Permit entitles a Carer to free fares when accompanying a person who is unable to travel on their own because of a disability. Applications can be made to Serco Transport and must be

accompanied by a supporting letter from their Doctor confirming the care-recipient is unable to travel on public transport unassisted. For further information phone on 9428 1933

Travel Concessions for WA Government Railroads (Country Services within WA) are available for carers of a person with a disability who has a Taxi Subsidy Scheme Card. They can travel on WAGR country services at half price. For reservation call: 131053. Contact: 9229 2051.

QANTAS can issue a **Qantas Carer Concession Card** to people with a disability and high level support needs, who require full time assistance of a carer while travelling on a plane. For further information or an application form contact NICAN, 1800 806 769.

Centrelink – Details of all payments are on their website: www.centrelink.gov.au and links are mostly under 'Carers' or 'People with Disability'. Alternatively you can call 13 27 17 for all enquiries. You should consult these webpages to see what may be applicable to you – what follows below is a brief overview:

Carers Allowance – isn't means tested and is around \$100 fortnight. Parents and a medical professional need to complete the application.

Carers Payment – is means tested and is a payment of around \$700 fortnight for a carer who is caring for someone with a severe disability. To apply, parents and a medical professional need to complete the form.

Carers Supplement – is automatically paid to anyone receiving Carers Allowance or Payment and is a yearly payment of around \$600 per eligible person in your care.

Carer Adjustment Payment – is a one-off payment helping families with increased costs following a sudden accident, illness or disability involving a child aged under seven years. Claims for this payment must be lodged with Centrelink within two years from the date of diagnosis of a severe illness/disability.

Child Disability Assistance Payment - is paid annually to people who receive Carer Allowance (child) for a period including 1 July. This includes carers whose payments are backdated to include 1 July. Carer Allowance (child) recipients will receive a Child Disability Assistance Payment of up to \$1,000 for each child in their care.

Schoolkids Bonus – is a twice yearly payment of around \$200 per primary school-aged child and around \$400 for each secondary school-aged child. It is paid to parents/carers who receive Family Tax Benefit Part A and meet other eligibility criteria. Children in preschool are not eligible.

Education Entry Payment – is a payment of around \$200 to help cover your study costs, if you are enrolled to study in an approved course and receiving Carer Payment or Disability Support Pension (or some others, check website for more info). You do not have to make a claim in order to receive the Education Entry Payment. Your eligibility will automatically be assessed by us when you provide proof of enrolment in an approved course of study.

Assistance for Isolated Children Scheme Payments – is a payment of \$62.40 per fortnight for students aged under 21 years receiving Disability Support Pension or Parenting Payment (single) and studying at primary level. For full eligibility criteria consult the website.

Continence Aids Payment Scheme (CAPS) – is a payment of around \$500 for individuals five years or older who have permanent and severe loss of bladder and/or bowel function (incontinence).

Disability Support Pension (DSP) — of around \$700 fortnight is paid to an individual with a disability over 16 years of age and under Age Pension age, who is permanently blind or have been assessed as having a physical, intellectual, or psychiatric impairment, and unable to work, or to be retrained for work, for 15 hours or more per week at or above the relevant minimum wage within the next two years because of your impairment, and have been assessed as having a severe impairment or as having actively participated in a program of support. To assess your eligibility for Disability Support Pension, we usually need a report from your doctor or specialist about your disability, injury or illness. You may also need to have a Job Capacity Assessment.

Youth Disability Supplement — is a payment of around \$100 fortnight and paid if you are under 21 and receive a DSP and should be automatically added to your DSP payment. If you are under 22 you may also be eligible for the youth disability supplement.

Mobility Allowance – a payment around \$80 fortnight for individuals aged 16 or over who cannot use transport without substantial assistance because of a disability, illness, or injury and need to travel to and from your home to look for work, do paid or voluntary work, or participate in study or training.

Telephone Allowance - helps toward the cost of your telephone bills if you have a telephone connected in your or your partner's name and you receive an eligible income support payment. There are two rates of Telephone Allowance, depending on your circumstances. Your eligibility for it is assessed when you make a claim for certain Centrelink payments.

Practical Supports

Commonwealth Carelink Centre – 1800 052 222 – Can provide a one-stop shop of information services that may be relevant or useful to you. Eg. they can tell you about Home Help, Maintenance or Modifications, personal Care, Respite care, Counselling etc... and may have funding for some of these.

Perth Home Care – 9204 7800 (general no) 9204 7801 (Crisis support) can provide HACC (Home and Community Care) services at low or no cost such as in-home respite, domestic/cleaning support, personal care or meal preparations etc... They also have an emergency Crisis Care Support Service which offers short-term (up to 3 consecutive days) of emergency support for the main carers of people who are frail aged or have a disability in the event of critical illness, carer's stress and any other urgent incident. The service is specifically for those incidents that occur without warning and result in the main carer being unable to continue to care for their family member. www.phcs.org.au

Read Write Now - 1800 018 802 is a service consisting of volunteers who are able to help with tutoring to improve adult reading and literacy skills. Individuals who have left school who may be pursuing further studies can access this support to help with understanding and editing assignments etc... Individuals must be capable of learning and improving and not have an intellectual disability and assignments will not be completed for them by a tutor.

Inclusion WA offers a Recreation Access Program and Youth Connect program for 12-18yo and 18yo + to assist individuals in accessing mainstream community activities. The program offers support in identifying activities, connecting with them, provides 1:1 support in attending initially with the view to individuals being able to independently participate in the future with support fading out. These programs at present are limited to families living south of Ocean Reef Rd. For more information contact: 9201 8900.

The Centre for Cerebral Palsy offers an **Independent Living /Transition Program** for those living in the Northern Suburbs who would like support achieving a targeted transition goal – such as accessing a community activity, developing transport, budgeting, cooking, cleaning, shopping skills etc. For more information contact The Centre for Cerebral Palsy on 9443 0506.

Transitional Living Program "TLP" is offered by Westcare as an individualised program for working adults with a disability to teach them the range of skills they will need to live a productive, safe and happy life in the community. The range of skills includes, community safety, transport use, basic first aid, budgeting, shopping and cooking. Future planning is an important aspect of the TLP and the coordinator works with participants, their families and LACs to plan for a successful future both before and during the program. Activ Library is a major library for the disability sector in WA. Schooling & Supports

Within the public education system there are four main supported options within the local area:

- 1) Including a child with a disability in any mainstream school and setting up an Individual Education Plan (IEP), Aide Applications and accessing the support of the Centre of Inclusive Schooling (CIS) where appropriate. The Disability Act prevents any school from excluding children with disabilities from attending, and support for the inclusion of children is available through the CIS and the Schools Plus program (through which Aide time is applied for). This is always the preferred option.
- 2) Accessing a local school that has an Ed Support Unit attached to it blending aspects of segregation and inclusion.
- 3) Accessing a local school that has an Ed Support Centre affiliated with it (ie. an independently operating special education school on the same premises as the local school).
- 4) Accessing a special school specific for children with disabilities.

Note: When a child turns 3 they can enter a 3's Plus Program. The year a child turns 4 is the year they start Kindy. They can either attend 2 full days a week or 4 half days a week. Children start Pre Primary in the year that they turn 5. Pre Primary is full-time. Children start year 1 in the year that they turn 6.

Schools with Specific Autism Programs

Heathridge Primary School has an Accelerated Learning Centre for Autism which provides two years of intensive intervention based on Applied Behaviour Analysis and the Assessment of Basic Language and Learning Skills (ABLLS) protocol. Students all have a diagnosis of autism and attend for 12 hours per week. Expectations are that students will enter mainstream with skills commensurate with their typically developing peers. Like the public sector, no school can exclude children with disabilities from attending however the supports available to the school may not be as extensive or readily available as the supports set up in the public sector.

School Holiday programs - Mix of Mainstream and Supported Options

All mainstream school holiday program are required to be accessible for children with disabilities / special needs. There is additional support available through some programs to assist in the inclusion of children with higher needs, whereas other programs may require you to supply your own support person. In all cases it is vital to discuss your child's support needs well in advance with the service and your LAC if appropriate, to make sure your child can be included and their needs met.

Although supported options may seem an 'easier' and 'safer' alternative, there are significant benefits when your child participates and is included in local community mainstream activities eg. Increased opportunities for developmental learning, socialisation, building of friendships and natural supports with local children and families & increasing awareness of disability inclusion within the community.
